GOOD FRIDAY AND A MOTHER'S GRIEF

I am not one to see a movie over and over again. The one exception, however, is Franco Zeffirelli's 1977 miniseries, *Jesus of Nazareth*. In my opinion it stands as the

most moving portrayal of the life and passion of Christ to date. While Mel Gibson's, *The Passion of the Christ*, may have set the bar for the most realistically *gruesome* portrayal of Jesus' passion, it doesn't even come close to capturing the depth and mystery of his life.

Over time I have, admittedly, grown desensitized to the portrayal of Jesus' passion in Zeffirelli's film. Maybe a little dose of Gibson's movie helps to establish a kind of "reality check." After all, Jesus was tortured and executed in one of the most inhumane ways know to history—crucifixion. His treatment at the hands of the Romans would have made the abuse of prisoners at Abu Ghraib seem mild in comparison.

What catches me off guard,

however—literally moving me to tears each time—is the portrayal of Mary's passion: her suffering, her grief. Zeffirelli's Mary, the mother of Jesus, is portrayed by Olivia Hussey, who had played Juliet in his 1968 film, Romeo and Juliet. And while her acting throughout the movie is admittedly stilted—as if the Virgin Mary were perpetually in some altered state of bliss or detachment—the grief she portrays as she cradles and rocks the lifeless body of her crucified son gets to me every time. The grief, after all, is a mother's grief over her murdered son. I'm not sure that there can be any loss greater than that of a parent losing a child. Other deaths are tragic, without a doubt. But a parent's loss of their child runs the deepest. It is by its very nature a crime against nature.

Sandro Botticelli's, *Lament*, shown here, captures this mother's grief in a moving and passionate way. Here Mary has swooned, her grief so deep, her loss so great. The overwhelming finality of holding her dead son in her

arms is too much to bear.

I have always wondered, even as one with decades of theological training, whether God couldn't have found a better way to redeem the world. If God is God, why was it necessary to sacrifice his son? What parent would do such a thing?

And as soon as I ask this question, I think of the countless mothers who sent their sons, and now daughters, off to war throughout our nation's history. I think, for example, of the unimaginable loss of life on the beaches of Normandy and around the globe. I touch the tragic grief of countless mothers whose own dreams died in those battles.

Sometimes, history has shown, it takes the *ultimate* sacrifice to bring an end to tyranny

and oppression. Death brings life. Oh, we yearn for a far better way, but in the face of evil whose intent is even greater evil, such sacrifice is the price to be paid.

On that tragic Friday, one we call "Good", a mother grieved inconsolably over the premature loss, the tragic waste, of her son—her first born.

But wait! On the Sunday that follows, the one we call "Easter", death gave way to life. A mother's grief gave way to a *disciple's* giddy joy. Through an intervening love greater than our imagination—greater than death—that dead and lifeless son is now our risen and victorious Lord.

SOUND SYSTEM UPDATE:

We are truly sorry for the inconvenience that this may cause those who need to be available for emergencies, but after having had two separate sound experts diagnose our sound system the verdict was unanimous. Our problems—the crackling and hissing and the dropping out of the sound during worship—are due to cell phones, blackberries and pagers. They all use the same or similar frequency as do our wireless microphones. And even if they are on mute (or vibrate mode), they still continue to emit a frequency that virtually jams our system. Nine years ago, when we purchased our present system, this interference was non-existent. Today we would not be able to purchase our system because of the frequencies on which it transmits. And it will only become worse once all our local TV stations go digital.

So, for now . . .

Please *POWER OFF* all cell phones and other communication devices during worship.

What will our long-term solution be? To replace the three wireless microphones that we presently have, two lavalier (or lapel) and one hand-held, would cost roughly \$2,100. Each system (costing approximately \$700 each) includes a wireless receiver, a "body pack" transmitter, and a clip-on

lavalier microphone. Some new ones come with an additional hand-held microphone.

Our plan, recently OK'd by council, is to start a fund-raising campaign for the sound system. Starting on Sunday, April 5th, envelopes will be available in the fellowship hall on which people can either make a pledge or include a donation to the sound. As soon as we have raised over 75% of the necessary funds to replace the wireless components, we will go ahead and make the purchase. A progress chart will be posted in the Fellowship Hall.

Please help us update our sound system! Once the summer comes and there are more competing signals in the air, we may have to go to not using the sound system at all. This is not only a problem for those who may have a hard time hearing in worship, it also makes it impossible to record our worship services for those who are homebound.

OUR DISCERNMENT PROCESS

As most of our members should know, St. Paul's has been engaged in a discernment process to determine the future priorities and ministry direction of St. Paul's. We began in January with a "kick-off" pot-luck event. During March we held a number of home meetings where over 80 of our members came together to share their insight and ideas about this congregation and the future they wish for it. Then on March 1, following the late service, we came together to explore and celebrate our history and what kinds of trends, patterns or meaning we were able to discover in it. Most recently we sent out letters to those in the congregation who had not yet participated in any of the process with that hope that they might be willing to share any insights and concerns they might have. It is our goal that everyone have the opportunity to share in this process so that any of the decisions about our future will reflect the widest consensus possible.

On March 28 the congregation will have come together once again to explore its "Secret Handshakes", that is, how we do what we do and why. The purpose of this is to be able to build upon the strengths that we have and change or amend any of our practices that do not serve God's mission in this place.

Throughout this process a Vision Team has helped to weigh through all of the responses and input from our members and carefully draw up interim goal statements that might be adopted by our congregation. These goals statements articulate a possible specific, attainable, and measurable goal that might guide the next 4 or 5 years of our ministry. While the Vision Team's job is to create the goal statements, it is up to the whole congregation to choose which ones it will adopt.

On Sunday, April 26, from 9AM until 1PM, the congregation will have the opportunity to decide the future of St. Paul's by prioritizing the goals of St. Paul's. Each person in attendance on that day will be given the opportunity to cast their votes for their first, second and third choices in four separate categories of goals. Through your vote, one goal per category will be selected. Later on, on Saturday, May 16 at 5PM, we will gather one more time to share your decisions and then start the process of organizing our future around these goals.

Please continue to pray for God's guidance as together we discern God's will for our future. Together our future promises to be bright!
