KNOCK, KNOCK . . .

One of my favorite "knock, knock" jokes was told to me by my, then, 8 year-old twin nieces, Josephine and Katalene. "Knock, knock," they would start. (They are *identical* twins, so this was in perfect stereo.) "Who's there?" I would respond. "Interrupting cow," they would giggle. "Interrupting cow . . . " "Moo, moo, moo, moo, moo!" they both would shout before I could ask, "who." Then we would all dissolve into laughter.

A "knock, knock" joke, like any good joke, works if we are caught off guard by them. Like the "moo, moo, moo" of the "interrupting cow," if the joke works, it's because it presents a surprising twist, it makes an unexpected connection between things that don't seem to go together. Our world-view is momentarily "interrupted". Interruptions of, or challenges to the familiar can be delightfully humorous or personally devastating, depending upon the context. Unexpected news can lift our spirits—even make us laugh—when it's good. It can shatter our lives, dropping us to our knees, when it is bad.

Our Stewardship Theme is about opening our doors to Jesus. Each week we have explored a new ministry "door" upon which Jesus is knocking, asking to be let in. But this is no joking matter. In Revelation 3:20, Jesus told the church at Laodicea, "Listen, I am standing at the door, knocking." He went on to say, "If you hear my voice and open the door, I will come in to you and eat with you, and you with me." This seems wonderful. It is important to note, however, that this invitation immediately follows Jesus' sharp condemnation of the Laodiceans. You see, as a city, Laodicea had everything. Situated on an important trade route, it was materially self-sufficient (except that it didn't have a very reliable water supply). This self-sufficiency led to an attitude of complacency. They had become lured into the delusional notion that their material prosperity made them secure and in need of nothing. But they were very wrong. Their false sense of security created a kind of spiritual smugness. In the eyes of God, they were actually "wretched, pitiable, poor, blind, and naked." To Jesus, they were neither hot nor cold, but lukewarm. Like something distasteful in the mouth, he was about to spit them out.

When this letter arrived in the church at Laodicea, it must have shattered their world-view. Quite the opposite of a joke, there was no good news here; no reason to laugh.

But . . . there was laughter (the joyful kind), yet to come. The message continued with a promise. By returning to God, they could find true wealth to overcome their spiritual poverty; God's righteousness with which to clothe their nakedness; and healing for their spiritual blindness. Jesus was telling them, "Listen! I am at the door, knocking!" It's not too late to let me in and live.

And it's not too late for any one of us. Jesus is knocking at the door of our hearts, *begging* to be let in. It takes both an act of faith *and of humility* to unlock the door from our side. (He will never force our doors open from *his* side, by the way.) We must trust that his promise is true, that when we open the door to Jesus he will bring with him a rich and satisfying feast.

We must also understand that when he enters, he does so *on his own terms*—never on our own. We may have ideas galore about what our lives (and our church community) ought to look like. We may be very invested in these notions and prone to disappointment if they are not fulfilled. But all that changes when the door is open to Jesus. He will call us to follow him in unexpected ways

and to unanticipated destinations. The journey, however, will be exhilarating.

"Knock, knock." It's Jesus calling. Will <u>you</u> open the door?
