THE PROMISE OF THE LILY

In September 2007, 16 months ago, we began our exploration through our stained glass windows. This month we come to the last window, one depicting a simply three-flowered lily. The window can be found in our balcony.

Perhaps if I had thought this through better, we might have begun this series a few months later so as to end in April to coincide with Easter. After all, for generations the lily has been used by the Church to symbolize Jesus' resurrection. Yet, I think it fitting to end our journey at this time of year, to coincide with a new year, a time of new beginnings and hope.

As symbols tend to go, there is rarely unanimity in regards to the various symbolic meanings of the lily. While the lily has been used as a symbol of Jesus' resurrection, and the three-flowered lily, pictured here, often symbolizes the Holy Trinity, its color (pure white) and simplicity has reminded many of the Virgin Mary, a symbol of faith and purity in her own right. Tradition has it that the "Madonna Lily" was yellow until Mary plucked it, where upon it turned white. According to historians, the lily, or in French, Fleur-de-lis, was used predominantly throughout the first half of the Middle Ages to symbolize Jesus. As time went on, however, its connection to the Virgin Mary became more common. Fulbert of Chartres (bishop of Chartres Cathedral from 1006 until his death in 1028) drawing upon Song of Solomon 2:2, described the Virgin Mary as, "a lily among thorns (lilium inter spinas), preserved from all impurity of the flesh and the spirit because she was to be the receptacle of Divine Wisdom." By 1300 the lily's symbolic connection to Mary was firmly established.

In the Protestant churches, however, the tendency is to understand the lily as symbolizing Jesus' resurrection. Around Easter time countless Sunday School

children are reminded of this symbolism when they are given a seemingly-dead bulb to bury in soil (to symbolize Jesus' death and burial) only to witness its springing forth into a beautiful white lily (to symbolize his Resurrection) a short time later.

For Christians, the resurrection of Jesus is the single most important event that defines our lives and empowers our faith. Like a spring lily pushing up out of the earth, our hope (rooted in Jesus' triumph over death) can spring up anew from the cold wintery ground of our lives. When we have lost hope, when we have fallen into despair, the promise of the lily, which is the promise of the resurrection, is that in Christ, hope and new life has become our inheritance. Death (especially including its myriad forms that tend to define us as lacking in worth and drawing us into meaninglessness and despair) has been overcome. We can greet the future with a renewed hope and confidence.

January 1st marks a new year in our secular calendars. It is quite common, therefore, to use the beginning of a new year as an opportunity to take stock of our past and to look forward in hope and renewed commitment towards our future. For the people of St. Paul's, in January we will begin holding a series of house meetings as a way of starting a process of

spiritual renewal and discernment for the whole congregation. (See article for more details.) And while it may seem that a daunting task lies ahead, we go into the new year, and into this time of discernment, with the promise of the lily: Where faith abides there is no barrier, not even death itself, that can keep us from fulfilling God's will for our lives. Like the lily that pushes up from the sepulchral ground into the light of spring, we too face the promise and limitless possibilities of our future. Through Christ, our hope is secure, our future is bright.


Dear People of Saint Paul's,

**RENEWING OUR VISION TOGETHER:
CELEBRATING OUR PAST, ASSESSING OUR
PRESENT,
DISCERNING OUR FUTURE**

According to those who study congregations, for a healthy congregation to remain healthy and growing, it must go through some kind of discernment or revisioning process every 4 or 5 years. The purpose of this process is to make sure that the ministries and programs of the congregation are what *God* wants at this time and in this place. It is time for us, the people of St. Paul's Church, to undergo such a discernment process.

In 2009, with the full support and endorsement of St. Paul's Council, the people of St. Paul's will begin a process of discernment that will include everyone who wishes to participate. We are calling the process: **Renewing our Vision Together**, and it will include opportunities to celebrate our past, assess our present, and discern God's will for our future.

The process will start in January and conclude on Pentecost Sunday, May 31. It will include the following 5 steps:

1) Late January through early February 2009:
"Ministry Assessment Home Meetings"

Members will be invited to attend one of several "home meetings" that will take place during this time to share their wisdom and insight into our present ministries. Guided by a member of the "Visioning Team" and hosted by one of our member families, we will assess the strengths as well as the challenges of our present ministries and programs in an effort to get a clearer idea about the kinds of goals we should set to guide us into our future.

If you would be willing to open your home to 8 to 10 people on a morning, afternoon or evening during late January to early February, please contact Pastor Hugh and let him know. By Sunday, January 4, there will be a sign-up poster in the fel-

lowship hall with some dates, times and locations of the home meetings. Our expectation is that the number of home meetings will grow as people learn more about it and are willing to open their homes for them.

2) Saturday, February 28, 2009 (time to be determined): **"An Evening to Remember: We Celebrate our History"**

We will come together as a community to remember and celebrate our history as a community of faith. Ours is a rich history. And as we remember and celebrate it together, we will discover clues to what makes us who we are, where our unique strengths and gifts lie, and how God has lead us to this point in time. From these conversations and remembrances, we will draw out insights that will help guide us as we discern God's calling for our future.

3) Saturday, March 28, 2009 (time to be determined): **"An Evening of Norm Identification: Discovering our 'Secret Handshakes'"**

Every congregation has its own distinct "culture" or set of "norms" that determines how we do what we do and why we do it that way. It is like our church "DNA", which shapes both our ministries and programs, and the way we act together. Every congregation also has a story that reflects this culture and captures our understanding of who we are. On this evening, we will gather to try to come to a deeper understanding of our culture, our "secret handshakes" and our story so that we can better identify which parts God wants us to keep and build upon, and which parts God wants us to change.

If we are truly committed to building a new and vibrant future together, we must not skip this evening. While it promises to be challenging (any

honest look at ourselves will reveal areas in need of growth and change) it also promises to be the most important gathering we will have during this process.

4) Saturday, May 16, 2009 (time to be determined): **“Our Vision Revealed”**

On this evening, the congregation will at last come together for a comprehensive look at the renew set of ministry goals and priorities for the next 5 years. It is our hope that the congregation will unanimously support these ministry goals and that each of us will personally commit to supporting their becoming our new reality. By the time our evening is over we will all have a very clear sense of where God is calling us.

5) Pentecost Sunday, May 31, 2009: **“We Celebrate our New Direction!”**

It is by the power of the Holy Spirit that we will move into our future with a clear sense of direction and a confident hope that with God all things are possible. It is fitting, therefore, that we celebrate our Renewed Vision on the day when we celebrate the Holy Spirit, God’s gift of power and presence.

Over the next few weeks you will learn more about our discernment process and how you can participate in it. At the present time we are gathering a team of 6 to 8 people to form a visioning team, a task force responsible for listening to the wisdom and insights of all those who participate and then gather that information together at each step along the way to aid in the discernment process.

During the month of April, after having completed the first three events— Ministry Assessment Home Meetings, an Evening to Remember, and an Evening of Norm Identification—the whole congregation will be invited to join the Visioning Team and council

in prayer (and fasting, for those who feel so called) as we sift through the many possible directions we might take together to discern God’s will and vision for us.

What can you do now? First, please pray for St. Paul’s and its Visioning Team as we begin to plan our gatherings and gather up the resources necessary to this endeavor.

Second, mark your calendars now with the above dates. While there may be some slight modification to our schedule, it is absolutely essential that everyone participate. Discerning God’s will for us is done through prayer and the Holy Spirit, and the Holy Spirit works through groups of people coming together for a common purpose.

Third, if you are willing to open your home to a small group during late January or early February, please let us know.

Please join us in this important journey of discovery as we “Renew our Vision Together”.


