PREPARING FOR THE *REAL* CHRISTMAS

Christmas is coming. We all know that. But for *which* Christmas are *we* preparing? That's the central question of Advent. There's the secularized and commercialized one that almost screams at us from television ads, "Buy me! Buy me!" This is the "Christmas" that our culture has created, that at its best suggests that doing nice things for needy strangers might make us feel better about ourselves, and at its worst cloaks itself in the sacred in order to peddle the profane. It's a Christmas that is as familiar to our materialistic culture today as it would be unrecognizable and offensive to Jesus' earliest followers.

The sad irony of it all is that we seem to prefer the imposter to the real. We seem more captivated by the marvels of the latest smart phone than we are by the miracle of the Incarnation—God becoming human in Jesus' birth. Perhaps our cultural familiarity with the Nativity story has caused us to become desensitized to its utter strangeness, immune to its power. To the extent that it doesn't constantly surprise, amaze, even shock and challenge us, we simply don't "get" it—not fully. The American writer and theologian Frederick Buechner called the Incarnation "a kind of vast joke whereby the creator of the ends of the earth comes among us in diapers." He concludes, "Until we too have taken the idea of the God-man seriously enough to be scandalized by it, we have not taken it as seriously as it demands to be taken."

So how does one prepare for the truly "scandalous" Christmas—the one that says "No!" to the cheap commercialization and "Yes!" to Jesus? By the disciplines of faith that call us to spend time in prayer and in the Word of God (going inward), and then by sharing the true gift of this season through loving action (moving outward). Advent is a time to anticipate and yearn for the coming of the Lord. The truth of the season, of Christian faith, is that we see Christ most clearly in the faces of the people around us. That's how He comes to us—in the other. And, like the Magi bearing their gifts, we pay homage to the Christ Child when we share the love of Christ through acts of mercy, justice and love. Dietrich Bonhoeffer once wrote, "As long as there

are people, Christ will walk the earth as your neighbor, as the one through whom God calls you, speaks to you, makes demands on you."

For which Christmas do *you* want to prepare? The authentic one that is all about Jesus and new life? Or the counterfeit one that, like sweet Christmas candy, gives us a temporary sugar rush, only to leave us afterwards even more hungry than before?

HUDSON VIEW COMMONS

Christmas Gift Program

Hudson View Commons is located on Hudson Street in Hartford, Connecticut. This project offers housing to people in transition from homelessness to independent living. They receive shelter *plus* care—care being anything from help with mental illness, HIV/AIDS, etc.

As part of Chrysalis, each participant is expected to give back through some kind of service. Their motto is "Getting help . . . Getting better . . . Giving back." Hudson View Commons has been in service since 1996 and now has a total of 28 low-income units, which is slightly less than other low-income housing projects. At the present time they have 26 residents (8 women and 18 men).

Because most of the residents don't have a supportive network of family and friends, Christmas time can be a very lonely time. St. Paul's has been asked to help put together some Christmas gift bags including any of the following:

- Slippers (sizes medium thru extra large)
- Socks
- Gloves
- Scarves
- Personal hygiene items
- · Laundry detergent

Jim Newmark will be coordinating the collection of all items. Please look for the Hudson View Commons Christmas Tree, located on the large table in the Fellowship Hall. Similar to our Angel Tree program, this tree will have gift tags with a needed item on it. All gifts should be returned to the designated gray tub in the coat rack area no later than Dec. 22. In lieu of purchasing a gift, Jim would welcome any cash donations as well.

THE LENGTH OF OUR SUNDAY PRAYERS

Prayer, after all, is central to what it means to be followers of Jesus. Our prayer list has lengthened because more and more people have asked that their family members, loved ones or friends be included in our prayers.

The challenge is to find the appropriate balance when it comes to including the names of people in our public prayers.

At the present time we have no fixed rules as to how we determine the makeup of our prayer list. People generally have asked that we include a name and we do. The challenge is not with adding a person's name to the list; it's with knowing when it's appropriate to remove a name from the list.

It can take the "wisdom of Solomon" to know when to remove a name from our prayer list. But, this is where you can help. If you know anyone who no longer needs to be on the prayer list, please let me know. For now, until we have discerned some fair and compassionate guidelines, we will "err" on the side of inclusion. Frankly, I would rather someone complain that we pray too much than too little.



WORSHIP OPPORTUNITIES DURING ADVENT

On Sunday, December 1, we

will keep our children in worship as we celebrate the Advent season of preparation. On that Sunday the children come forward to witness the lighting of the first candle in our Advent Wreath and the raising of the large blue Advent Banners, signaling the start of Advent. In addition, each child will be given an Advent Calendar to take home, with the hope that each family will take time each day to open a new calendar window and explore the images and scripture verses found there. Advent is the season that helps us prepare for Christmas, and that means preparing our hearts and lives for Jesus—not Santa, holiday elves, or winter snowmen. Let's make a good start together!

On **Sunday, December 8**, our children will help us celebrate the Advent season of preparation by placing Christmas ornaments on the Christmas tree. Please bring an ornament from home (one that will be returned to you after the Christmas season, but one that is not irreplaceable in the event of a mishap). We will use these ornaments to decorate our Christmas tree as an act of preparing for the birth of Christ.

On **Sunday, December 15**, our Sunday school children and our older youths will present "Star of Love," a Christmas pageant for the whole congregation. This will involve the whole congregation as we, together, celebrate in story and song the birth of our Lord, Jesus. Please plan to invite your family, friends, and neighbors to this special Christmas treat! Remember: **There will be no 8AM service on the 15th.**

On Christmas Eve, Tuesday, December 24, St.

Paul's will celebrate Jesus' birth with a setting based on the St. James Christmas Service. This is the same setting that we have used for the past several years. The St. James Christmas Service has set the words of the traditional liturgy to familiar Christmas carols. Our **early service** is scheduled for **6 PM** and will be geared a bit more toward children and families including a special Christmas message with Marvin. The choir will present festive Christmas anthems to further set the tone. During our **late service**, at **9 PM** we will turn the lights down a bit lower to create a more reflective atmosphere. Both services will include Holy Communion.

On **Sunday, December 29** we will have only one service at 9:30 AM.


