BECOMING A CHURCH OF EXPERIMENTATION, INNOVATION AND CREATIVITY

BE IT RESOLVED that the New England Synod in assembly establish this synod to be a place of experimentation, innovation and creativity in order to further the mission [to] which God in Christ has called us.

The "experts" will tell you that the church, as a religious institution, is in the midst of a steady, numerical decline. While it is clear that people still believe in God and hunger to be part of something that matters, the old ways of being the church (including the ones we love) no longer work for a growing number of people. As the Church of Jesus Christ, we are in a period that has been called the "Great Unravelling." Like a sweater that has been unravelled, we must begin knitting together something new. What this is and what it will look like is unknown.

At the Synod Assembly (June 5-7), Bishop Hazelwood and others put forward a resolution "on becoming a synod of Experimentation, Innovation, and Creativity," from which I quoted above. To be able to reach out with the Good News of Jesus to those who are hungering for hope and real meaningful connection, we must be willing to try new things. And, as we do it's going to be OK if, from time to time, we fail. Not everything new we try will work.

Starting on Thursday, August 7 (at 7 PM), and continuing for at least 12 Thursday evenings in a row, St. Paul's will add a new kind of worship experience. While we can't tell you exactly what it will be like—or even where it will take place (the sanctuary, the lower level of the PE Building, or even outside if the weather's nice?)—we can tell you that it won't be like anything we've done before. There will be prayer, the reading of Scripture, and a (short) message. There may be singing, perhaps a time for healing, and even an occasional meal. But the "structure" of this worship service will be different. The Holy Spirit will be in charge, shaping things as we go. We can also tell you that in no way will this time of worship replace or take away from our traditional Sunday worship services. The Thursday Evening worship services are in addition to our Sunday experiences.


